## Course Aims & Objectives

According to the *Undergraduate Catalog*, students will come to understand "Women's experience in America from colonial period to modern times with emphasis on changes in women's working, family, sexual and political lives." To better help you to understand these aspects of women's lives you will be reading three standard women's history textbooks, as well as a volume of women's letters from the colonial period through the present. In addition you will do a research paper on one particular woman so you can study how her life is (or how it is not) representative of American women in general.

Without question you should be in class every day, ready to learn. To encourage positive contributions to class discussions, you should know that I use participation to boost borderline grades at the end of the semester. Also note: You must complete every component noted above in order to earn a passing grade in this course and you must pass the Final Exam as well.

#### **Missed Quizzes**

Since all assignments must be completed for you to earn a passing grade in this course, you must make up any quiz that you miss during the semester. You will lose 10% (10 pts.) if you do not take it at the scheduled time, and an additional 10 pts. each day after that. If you know you will miss a quiz, you should arrange a time to take it early. If you have an excused absence on the day of a quiz (with official documentation), then the deductions will not begin until after the end of the excused absence.

## Late Papers

As with missing quizzes, papers that are turned in late will lose 10% (10 pts.) per day. In this course we will not have class on the day your papers are due at 5:00 p.m. You may hand them in via e-mail as an attached Word document, or in person at Dr. Myers' office in Williams Hall. As of 5:01 p.m. they are considered late, and 10 pts. will be deducted from them, with an additional 10 pts. every 24 hrs. after that.

#### Grading Scale:

A (100%-90%), defined as "excellent" at BGSU...A students go above and beyond what is asked of them. B (89.99%-80%), defined as "good" at BGSU...B students have a good grasp of all the required material. C (79.99%-70%), defined as "acceptable" at BGSU...C students generally know what is going on. D (69.99%-60%), defined as "poor but passing" at BGSU...D students struggle w/concepts or writing. F (below 60%), defined as "failure" everywhere...students only fail my courses if they do not complete assignments/exams, or do not follow the directions they are given on those assignments/exams.
